
Reunion - Class of 1995

128th Founder's Day





Hletter from one MGS girl to another

April 2016

To my great grand-daughter, Astrid,

Thank you for inviting me to the MGS canteen at Blackmore Drive to celebrate your birthday with you. It was lovely to see you and your classmates giggling away in the same 'sailor suit' that I, too, wore in the 1930s.

Looking at you brought back many fond memories of life long before the Internet, Facebook and Taylor Swift. I hope that this letter will inspire you and all MGS girls, both past and present, to be proud of your MGS legacy and embrace the lifelong blessing of being an MGS girl.

MGS, to me, is not just a school. It is our family. My maternal grand-mother, Siauw Mah Li, was "adopted" at six years old by Miss Sophia Blackmore because her father wanted her to have a formal education and learn English. She was the first Chinese girl to attend MGS. While there, she lived at Nind Home, the affiliated boarding house. She went on to teach at the school. Later, my mother, Darling Kim Neo and her sisters, Susie Gin Neo and Edna Gek Neo, all attended the school and stayed at Nind Home as well.

As our family was closely connected to MGS and specifically to Miss Blackmore, it was only natural that my mother Darling shared the good news of the impending arrival of her first born with Miss Blackmore. Well known for having strong opinions, Miss Blackmore advised my mother to "name the child Happy, whether it be a boy or girl". And so it came to pass, that on November 13th, 1923, I was indeed named Happy Tan. That makes me the 3rd generation of women in our family to attend MGS, and you the 6th. I understand that at ninety-three years old I am one of the oldest living MGS alumnae.

My memories of MGS go back as far as to the time when the school was at Short Street. My father hired a rickshaw driver to bring me and my neighbours to school. When MGS

moved to Mount Sophia, he paid the 'uncle' more to pull the rickshaw up the hill. Little did he know that the rickshaw puller dropped us off at Adis Road instead, and asked us to walk up the hill ourselves!



When my mother passed away, I stayed at Nind Home on Mount Sophia for a short period of time. When I married your great-grandfather, Chen Jan Jee, I was delighted to discover that his mother,





my mother-in-law, Chia Kim Lian, was also an MGS girl who attended the Bible Women's Training School. If you and your friends go to the Methodist Archives, many photos of her with Misses Sophia Blackmore and Mary Olson can be found. One such photo of her with Miss Blackmore can be found just outside the Kwa Geok Choo Auditorium in your school now! She's the one with a baby on her lap.

What I find most wonderful about the MGS spirit is that it is so strong and infectious. Your grand-uncle James Chen is what I call an 'Honorary' Old Girl. He has been actively taking photographs of, and for, MGS for the last 30 years and has captured many of the significant moments of recent Mah Li carrying her eldest daughter, Kim Neo, mother of MGS history. Legend has it that he met his wife, Mrs Happy Chen Christina Chen (Class of '79) along an MGS corridor

while taking photographs of the MGS teachers for the school magazine.

Your grandmother, Victorine Chen (Class of '62) was a prefect and later extremely involved as a parent-volunteer when your mummy was in school and helped out with the primary school reading programme. Even now, she is still ready to whip up a batch of coconut candy from Ellice Handy's cookbook for MGS events. Your mother, Joy-marie Toh (Class of '89) was also a prefect and continues to serve MGS

actively through the Alumnae Association. I hope that you will always maintain your ties with MGS - or the 'Monkey Girls' School' as we knew it, even when I was little.

Both your grandmother and mother spent all their school lives on the Mount Sophia campus. Each of us has recollections of our different times. I had never visited the current location until you entered Primary One! But I know that time and space remain unchanged in an MGS girl's heart. One day, you too will reflect on your time at MGS through laughter and tears.


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invited to lay down their lives, allow Jesus to set them free and take hold of the freedom that is theirs when they accept Jesus as their Lord and Saviour.
